NATIONAL TEAM COMPETITIONS



Guam's National Teams had full schedules in 2019 with the Matao, Guam Men's National Team, taking center stage this year with FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022™ Qualifier of the Asian zone Rounds 1 and 2.

Guam's national team featured a sports psychologist for the first time. Marcel Noronha was included in the Matao staff for the qualifiers and also held sports psychology sessions with Guam's youth national teams.

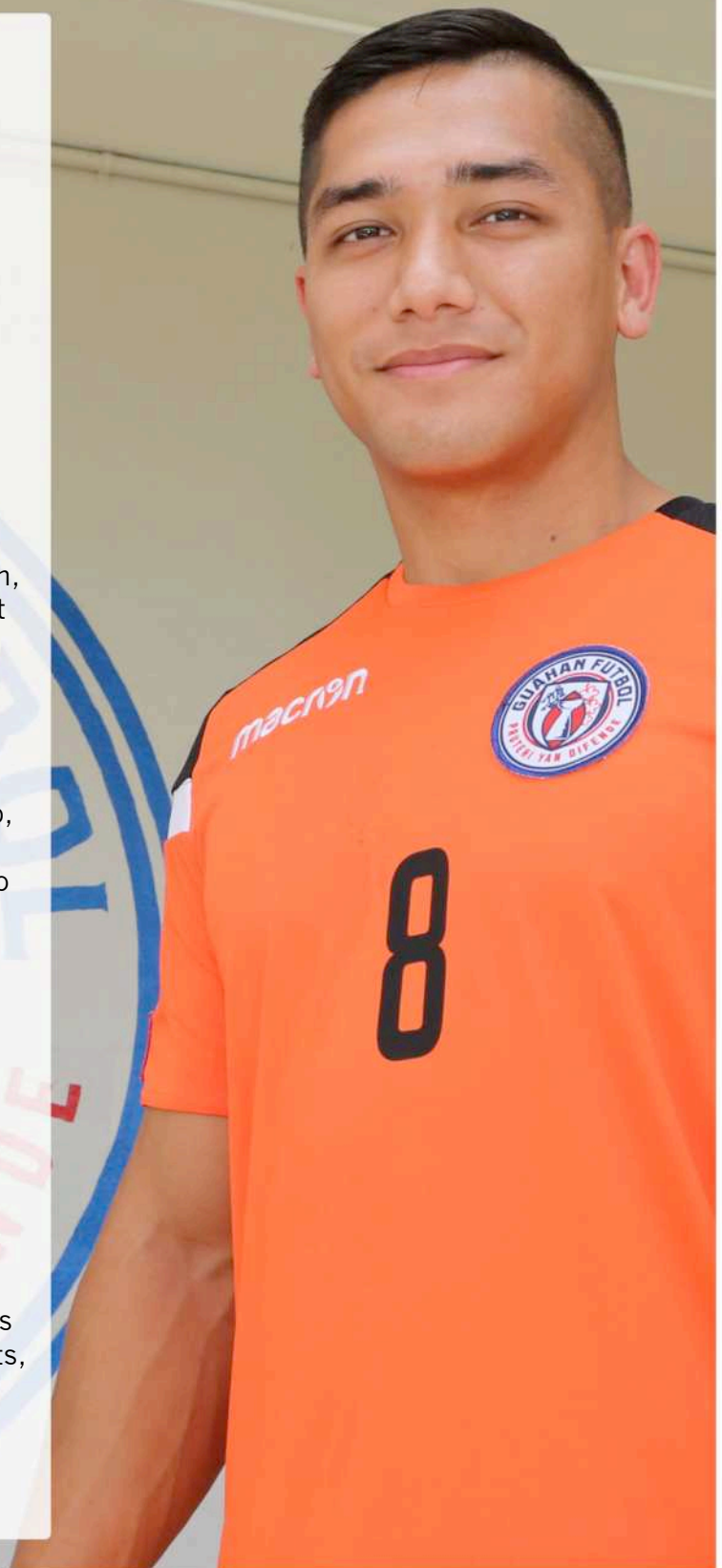
Matao debut new crest in World Cup Qualifiers

When the Matao, Guam men's national football team, steps onto the pitch in Thimphu, Bhutan for the first leg match of the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022™ Qualifier of the Asian zone Round 1 on June 6, the team will debut the newly created national team badge on their match kits.

The new badge, which took almost a year to develop, features cultural elements for identity, including a latte stone, the shape of the Guam seal, Chief Gadao cave painting depiction to represent the Matao, and tropical hibiscus flowers in a rising depiction to represent the Masakåda, Guam women's national football team.

"As a National Team player, this badge serves as a reminder that we are representing much more than just ourselves," said Mark Chargualaf, a midfielder called up to the Matao for June's qualification matches. "I know that whenever I am given the opportunity to wear this badge, I have to give everything and at time go above and beyond when called upon. The badge is a glimpse into our island's culture and identity, and we place it above our hearts, because like our hearts, it keeps us going."

“I feel very excited and honored to be a part of the team that will unveil our new National Team logo on the world stage, and I hope we get the results that will allow us to showcase it even more for the rest of this year and the coming years,” Chargualaf added.

Chargualaf spearheaded the project to develop the new identity logo for Guam’s National Teams and formed a focus group made up of current and former national players from both the men’s and women’s programs. Included in the group were Dominic Gadia, Brett Maluwelmeng, and Jason Cunliffe from the men’s side and Anjelica Perez, Rhoda Bamba, Cara Walsh, and Carla Haddock from the women’s side.

“This new badge was developed to follow the theme of our National Team programs, in that we are in this rebuilding phase and we wanted something fresh and new to symbolize that,” Chargualaf said. “We also wanted something more specific to the National Team programs, hence the two symbols representing the Men’s and Women’s programs – the Gadao cave depiction and the rising hibiscus flowers, respectively.

“The process was the tricky part in that there were no guidelines as to how we would go about this, added with the pressure of knowing that end product had to be something that our National Teams and fans were going to be proud of. As a group, we met to decide on which elements were crucial in the new logo. From there, we approached a graphic artist (Ricky Catindig of W5 Design Studios) who was very passionate about helping with this and who also had some great points in the concept and design of the logo. A couple of sample designs later, we ended up with the final product which was simple yet meaningful,” added

Chargualaf, who made his senior-level debut in 2007 as a 16-year-old.

The badge also will be placed onto Guam Women's National Team match kits, as well as youth national team match kits.

"On behalf of GFA, I commend Mark and all involved in creating this new identity badge for our National Teams," said GFA President Tino San Gil.

"This, among other upcoming cultural immersion initiatives at GFA, will instill even more pride and confidence in our players and staff representing Guam on the international stage. I look forward to seeing the Matao display their new kits with the new badges during the upcoming FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022™ Qualifier of the Asian zone Round 1 matches against Bhutan, as well as the team's progression through qualification."

As part of the first-ever Kamp Tinituhon, an induction camp for U16 and U19 elite athletes, the participants organized a soccer carnival for Harvest House foster kids at GFA. Each foster kid was paired with either one or two youth national players and participated in skills stations and games. Lunch was provided for participants.

Additionally, the Kamp's U19 participants also visited Harvest House for their Back-to-School event, assisting in distributing back packs with school supplies, as well as playing games with kids in the program.

Athletes in Kamp Tinituhon also participated in the 75th Guam Liberation Day parade under the Guam Football Association umbrella, the first time Guam FA had joined the annual parade as an organization.

Before the start of the Triple J Auto Group Robbie Webber Youth Soccer League, club representatives also were provided with AFC Molten-brand footballs for their respective clubs to use for training.

On October 4, 2019, Guam Football Association and Special Olympics Guam signed a Memorandum of Agreement creating “Unified Soccer” as the newest sport under the Special Olympics Guam offerings for its athletes.

Close to 50 athletes registered for the first training sessions, with the GFA Special Olympics Jamboree scheduled for Nov. 30, 2019.

“I was in the GFA office one day and a parent approached me and said, Tino, come out with me to the parking lot – and there, in the parking lot, was her son, who had a disability, outside the fence looking in watching other kids play,” said GFA President Tino San Gil, trying to hold back tears. “She said, ‘he wants to play, what can you do for my kid to play?’ The scene and conversation has stayed with me, and when my brother Sam told me that Special Olympics Guam wanted to start a project with GFA, I didn’t hesitate.

“We owe it to our community, all of our kids, and as of today, as soon as I sign this MOA, there is no more fence at GFA,” San Gil added.

The partnership was made possible with a grant from AFC Dream Asia. At the training sessions, youth national team players volunteered to help coach athletes in the program.

COACH EDUCATION



A total of 12 coaches in Guam passed the 2018-2019 AFC "B" Coaching Certificate Course held in Guam.

The 12 coaches from Guam are Ross Awa, Rhoda Bamba, Bryan Cadiz, Derrick Cruz, Keith Dickson, Matthew Elwell, Dr. Gary Larkin, Anjelica Perez, Maggie Phillips, Chyna Ramirez, Kimberly Sherman, and Jeremy Wendal.

The course concluded Jan. 25 and was facilitated by visiting AFC Instructor Yusuke Adachi and assistant instructor Kazunori Ohara. The course was divided into two parts, with the first session concluding in late 2018.

GFA Coach Education Development Officer Dominic Gadia also held GFA "D" Coaching License courses throughout the year, including a special GFA Skill Acquisition Coaching Course for Guam's youth national teams.

Youth national team players who passed the course assisted with the United Airlines GFA Center of Excellence.

In addition to the GFA Skill Acquisition Course, local coaches also took part in GFA Goalkeeping Skill Acquisition courses throughout the year with instructor Ross Awa. GK courses were held quarterly in 2019.

In the early part of 2019, then GFA Technical Director Belinda Wilson set up meetings with GFA's member youth clubs to assist with club organization and coaching.

In 2019, GFA is supporting Matao Head Coach Karl Dodd earn his Professional Coaching Diploma, the highest coaching certification, with the Football Federation of Australia.



REFEREE DEVELOPMENT



New to 2019 in Referees Development was the EAFF Referees Course facilitated by FIFA/AFC Referee Instructor Sachiko Yamagishi and assistant Tadashi Hase, both from Japan, in January.

A couple dozen referees from both Guam and the Northern Mariana Islands participated in the weeklong course.

The course was designed not only to provide training for young referees, but to also support local referee instructors continue referee development. Local referee instructors were given slots for presentations guided by the visiting instructors and expected to provide reports of local courses held during the year.

Following the EAFF Course, GFA referee instructors Shawn Spindel and Kyle Legozzie spearheaded two introductory referee courses for new referees ahead of the Triple J Auto Group Robbie Webber Youth League seasons, as well as sessions for youth national team players.

In the summer, the GFA Referees Department continued its annual GFA Referee Camp, with first-year referees at the LeoPalace Resort Guam.

Other courses held in 2019 included refresher courses, as well as a futsal referee course.



REFEREE DEVELOPMENT



In addition to courses and camps held in Guam, local referee instructors Kyle Legozzie and James Oh participated in the FIFA Futuro III Instructors Course in Korea, Republic in September.

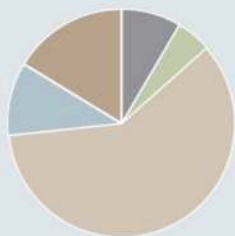
The FIFA course provides:

Currently, the Guam FA Referees Department oversees over 100 referees in various leagues from the youth level to Guam's top domestic competitions and leagues. Overall, there are roughly 3,300 official matches played. Of the 100+ referees, 41 are female.

Top performing referees – male and female – feature in the Budweiser Soccer League, Guam's premier men's soccer league.

In conjunction with the GFA Futsal and Beach Soccer Committee, GFA Grassroots Manager Ross Awa organized two new grassroots events in 2019:

The futsal program at the Haya Youth Center, run by the Department of Youth Affairs catering Guam's southern villages, was the first of its kind. Following the pilot program's success, plans are in place to expand the opportunity to youth from the northern and central villages. The program was part of the youth center's overall fitness program. GFA coaches visited the Agat gym twice a week for six weeks to introduce the sport of futsal to youth, with the long-term goal to create a larger pool of players to eventually create elite and recreational pathways for futsal.

2019 saw major additions to the Guam Football Association National Training Center.

- Office

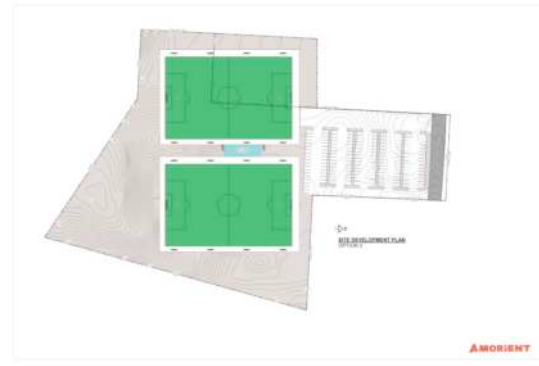
In addition to training equipment, Guam FA also invested in the EPTS Polar System & Hudl/Sports Code Coaches Plus Sports Sessions, mainly for national team athletes to aid in high performance. The monitoring devices were included into the Guam National Program and are currently utilized by all national squads – including youth groups.

Other than the Fitness Center, Guam FA also upgraded its second-level bleachers and added an additional third-floor workspace, first utilized during the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022™ Qualifier of the Asian zone Round 2 matches.

Additional improvements to the central facility included the painting of three new murals – one of a waving Guam flag, one of the new Guam National Team crest, and one of FIFA's Living Football logo.

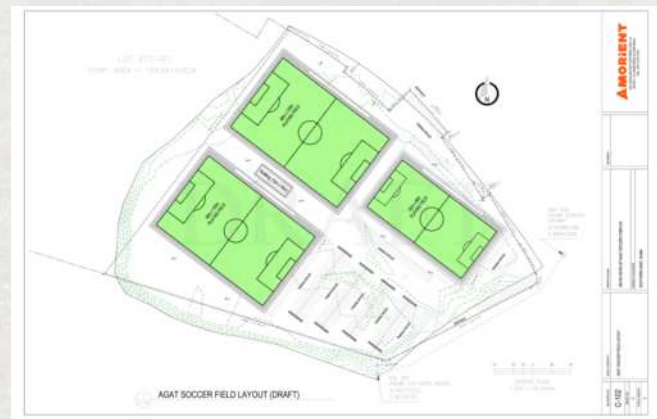
All improvements were done in addition to routine maintenance, painting touch-ups, and other beautification initiatives.

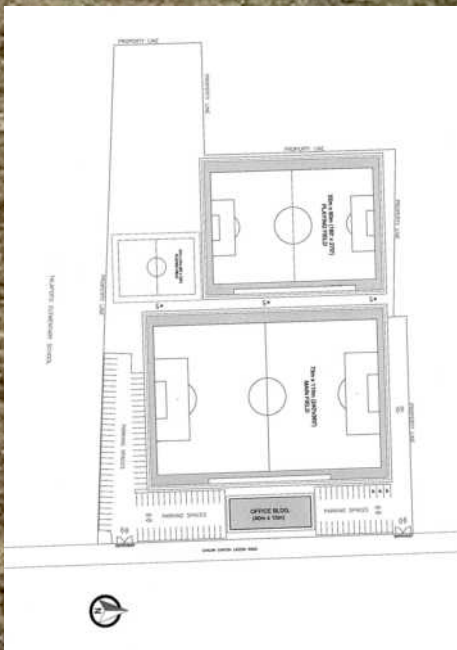

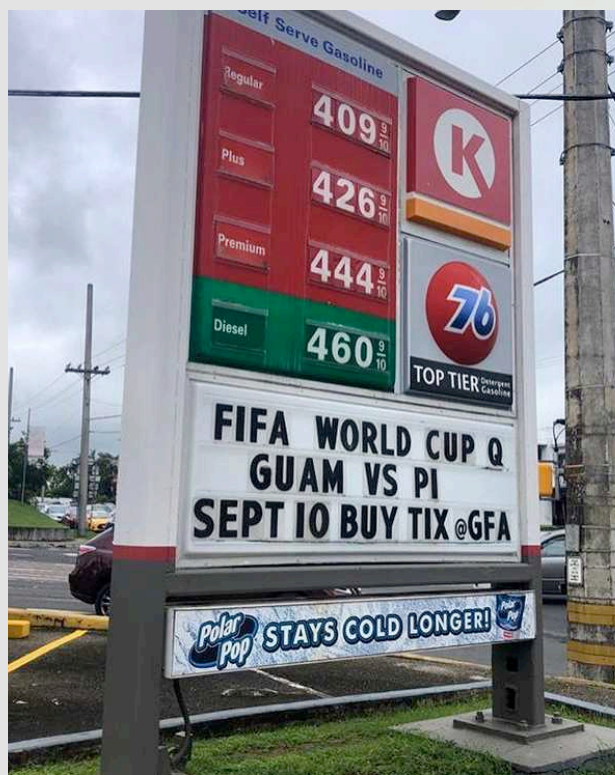
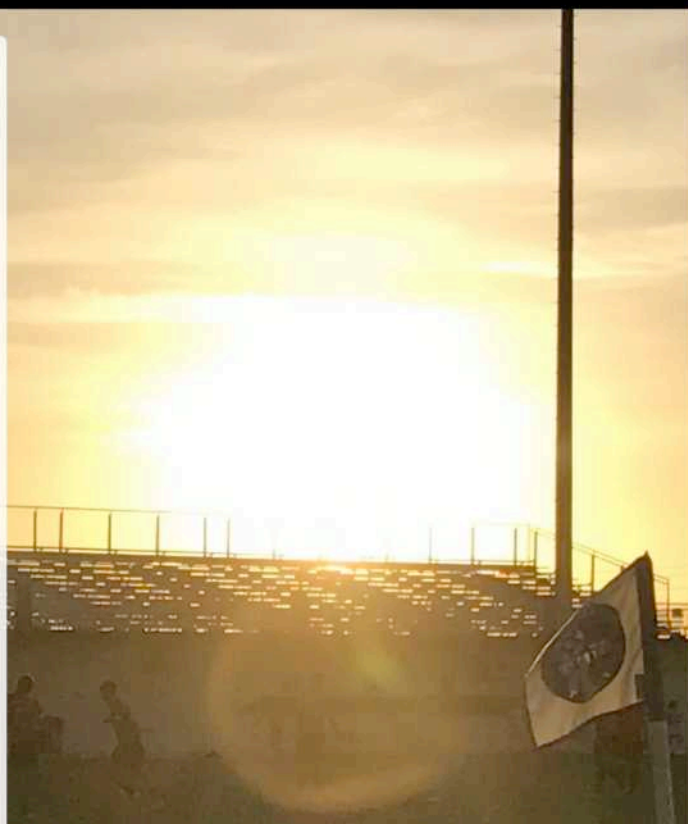
